

Application Process

Visa

Many international students must apply for an entry visa at the German Embassy in their home countries before they arrive in Germany.

EU/EAA country nationals

· Citizens from the EU, EFTA, and EWR do not require an entry or student visa

Non-EU/EAA country nationals

- Check the exact conditions and procedures at the German embassy in your home country. Book an appointment with the embassy as early as possible. It may take months to process your visa
- Often you need the university's application confirmation to apply for a visa appointment
- [!] Please note that it is not possible to apply for a student visa upon arrival and that a
 tourist visa cannot be converted to a student visa
- Check out <u>The Deutscher Akademischer Austauschdienst</u> (DAAD) for further information on this
- Students who are required to open a blocked account could do so either with an online service, such as Fintiba, or at Deutsche Bank.

Residence permit

- The entry visa must be converted into a residence permit within 90 days upon arrival in Germany
- Note the distinction, the visa will allow you to enter the country, the residence permit
 will allow you to stay for the purposes of studying

Beware of scams! There are some scams around flat renting in Berlin, so make sure to never send money before you actually see the place or the person renting it to you!

Health Insurance

In order to get enrolled at TU Berlin, you will have to prove sufficient <u>health insurance</u> as long as you are under the age of 30. <u>Here</u> you will find a guide explaining the German health system in more than 40 languages.

If you don't have any health insurance

- · You either have to get statutory or private health insurance in Germany
- Please note that only a proof of health insurance from German health insurance providers can be accepted for the enrollment procedure
- In case of opting for the private one, you must sign a waiver from the statutory health insurance for the whole duration of your studies. This cannot be revoked.
- Please tell your health insurance provider to submit a current form called the "Versicherungsbescheinigung zur Vorlage bei der Hochschule" (Proof of insurance for submission to the university) to TU Berlin.

Students from EU / EEA countries and Switzerland

If you are a citizen of another European Union state, you can be exempted from the German statutory health insurance requirement.

- If you have a form with the title "E 111" or a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC), or if you have statutory health insurance in your home country, please go to any German statutory health insurance provider and obtain a waiver
- If you get employed or if you start self-employment in Germany, you have to be insured according to German law

Students from non-EU Countries

If you have statutory or private health insurance in your home country or you have private or family health insurance in Germany, you can go to any German statutory health insurance provider to obtain a waiver.

Staturory Health Insurance Providers

To obtain your statutory health insurance, you simply have to file in a registration form of your chosen health insurance company. For further information, please visit make-it-in-germany.com!

Banks

- Make sure you have access to sufficient funds especially in the first couple of weeks or even months.
- Students from outside the EU are often required by the German embassy to open a blocked account to receive a visa, but only gain access to this account after registration of residence. We advise you to take precautions and either carry an emergency amount of cash or make sure that you can get cash sent to you via other channels.
- In Germany we pay either in cash or more often with EC cards which you will get once you have a valid bank account in Germany.
- To open a bank account, you may go to the Sparkasse, Berliner Volksbank, or Commerzbank. Local branch offices have excellent services for students. Otherwise, N26 is a suitable online bank. Find more information here!

Languages in Berlin

- Most Germans speak English in various degrees of fluency.
 The course instruction and common language at the EUREF-Campus is English.
- TU Berlin is also organizing language tandems, which can be very helpful for learning German! Check out the TU student organization "<u>Language and Culture Exchange</u>"(Sprach-und Kulturbörse, SKB)
- For everyday translation needs, we recommend the online translator <u>deepl.com</u>



- We highly recommend the <u>SKB</u> of TU Berlin, with whom we cooperate to offer German courses to those interested.
- There is also the language center <u>ZEMS</u> of TU Berlin, where you can also find good German language courses for all levels

Anmeldung

- Anmeldung is the process of registering at a specific address in Germany, this is done at a local citizens' office/town hall (Bürgeramt).
- Completing your Anmeldung is a crucial first step for your relocation to Germany. It is not only a legal requirement but also an essential pre-requisite for getting a German tax ID (<u>Steueridentifikationsnummer</u>), carrying out most administrative tasks and applying for a <u>residence permit/visa in Germany</u>.
- At the end of your Anmeldung appointment, you will be issued an address registration certificate (Anmeldebestätigung).
- For full details of how to complete your Anmeldung in Berlin, see this guide.

Residence Permit

- Temporary residence permits are given for students for the length
 of their program. During their education, they can work full-time for
 120 days or half-time for 240 days. Besides, they can engage in
 work-study positions.
- After they finish their degree, <u>students can extend their temporary</u> <u>permit for another 18 months to find a job in Germany</u> (job-seeking visa).
- If the students find a job, they can then <u>apply for an Employment</u> <u>Residence Permit</u> (working visa).



Language schools in Berlin

Orientation Week

- We will start the master's program jointly with a few days of orientation we will show
 you the main campus in Berlin-Charlottenburg, the EUREF-Campus in Berlin-Schöneberg,
 the main institutions, libraries, and the city as well as introduce you to the IT system and
 facilities on the campus.
- You will meet your class members outstanding people from all over the world with whom you will spend a lot of time during your first year of study.

Student ID Card

- Upon enrollment, you will be issued a matriculation number and a student ID card. The card serves as your TU Berlin student ID, and your TU Berlin library card.
- When you pick up your student ID card, you will also receive an information letter with a
 password to set up your tubIT email account.

Tuition Fees

1. Tuition fees:

- you can choose between full payment or 3 or 6 installments to pay your tuition fees, the 1.
 installment is to secure your study place
- please manage your payment schedule well throughout your studies and check your invoice for payment deadlines

2. Semester fees:

- each semester there are semester fees due you will find all information and bank details in your tuPORT
- there are certain deadlines for re-registration before each semester, if you miss them a late fee of currently 19,94€ applies, TU Berlin will inform you about these deadlines via email

Exam and Papers

- Each module concludes with an examination. An explanation of the German grading system looks like is shown in the table below. The method of calculation of the final grades is described in the Examination and <u>Study Regulations of your program</u>.
- Everything that was taught in the lectures, tutorials and compulsory company visits within the module may be subject to examination.
- In case students want to withdraw from an exam, they have to inform the competent body
 at least one day before the exam date. Otherwise, the exam may be rated as failed.
- An exam may be retaken only if the previous exam was a failure, receiving a grade below 5,0 and this can be done up to three times. The retake exams usually take place at the beginning of the following semester. If you fail the final attempt, you will be expelled and cannot complete the program.

Psychological Counseling

Who completes their studies without a hitch? The demands of studying and also life can
be difficult. TU Berlin <u>Psychological Counseling</u> supports you in crisis situations, both
study-related and personal. Problems that bring students to Psychological Counseling
may include stress, conflicts arising during group work, exam anxiety, ...

Mentoring Courses

- Mentoring courses are intended to make learning easier for international students at TU Berlin during the first semesters.
- The mentoring program is related to the current tutorial and exercise tasks of the lecture, i.e. there is no additional homework to be done.
- Taught by academic staff or student tutors, they offer help related to the following topics: Elimination of academic difficulties, Preparation for exams, Orientation at the start of your studies, Introduction to ways of learning and teaching at the university.

Internships and Working Student Positions

- During the 2-3 months of semester break, you can use your time for internships. We adivse
 you to plan these in advance. Internships can lead to student working or even full-time
 positions: it's worth to spend time looking for interesting internship positions!
- In Germany, it is fairly common to have a working student position while studying. We
 encourage you to apply, but please remember that your studies always come first!

Semester Breaks

- The Semester Break is not termed as "holidays", but "lecture-free time", because that is
 what it is time useful for you to deepen your studies according to your personal field of
 interest, to prepare for the coming term, for internships and educational trips around
 Germany and Europe. Prepare early for this lecture-free time to make the most of it.
- If you are planning to work or wish to apply for a working-study program, spent some time
 researching companies that may offer you a placement.

Master's Thesis

- With the Master's thesis you prove that you are able to work independently and scientifically
 on a specific topic of your study program within a limited period of time (§43 AllgStuPO).
 How much time you have available for the work is specified in the regulations of your degree
 program. This also means that you cannot expect to know your topic before the time starts.
- There is a **master's thesis application process**, and you can make suggestions and share your specific area of interest so that your coordinators and professors can help you "tailor" a topic.
- Usually a certain number of achieved ECTS is required to start with the thesis please check the study regulations of your program.

Graduation

- · You have all the requirements to graduate?
 - You've passed all modules successfully, you passed your Master's thesis successfully?
 Congratulations!
- The evaluation of your thesis and the certification process usually take a few weeks/months plan around 2-3 months for it
- Prepare for the job search / work visa -> more information can be found at the <u>TUB</u> <u>International Office</u>
- Get ready for graduation there are 2 ceremonies per year one in July and one in December
 we are so excited to celebrate this special day with you!

Networking

- · Networking is a great way to quickly get your bearings in Berlin!
- There are a variety of conferences and events check online to see which ones are of interest to you!
- You can also contact your lecturers and companies that we visit during excursions you have nothing to lose!
- You can also use LinkedIn to network with people at a company you'd like to work for, for example!

Life After Graduation

- Congrats, you are now one of the few people worldwide well versed in your specialist field of study!
- You can now also start sharing the expertise you have gained, slowly growing into a senior role in business, or teaching, be it as
 a Ph.D. student or a professional.
- You are now part of the vast and growing alumni network of the academic directors, the lecturers, of TU Berlin, and the EUREF-Campus: please join our <u>LinkedIn group</u> to stay in touch and stay up to date!
- Take part in our Alumni Conference (usually in September) for further networking opportunites and good times with fellows alumni!


